
NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE TENNIS CLUB

- focus is on adult participation and development; modest junior activity

NIAGARA ACADEMY OF TENNIS

- 4 hard courts, outdoors in the summer, dome for the winter
- clubhouse with meeting space and fitness training rooms
- established in 1997 as a high-performance and academic centre for international and national junior players
- new ownership just before covid put such programs on pause
- pivot to full-service community club for the Town of Lincoln (population 24,000 and growing fast)
- long tradition of hosting OTA junior tournaments, but opted out this winter in order to serve adult play on weekends

GRIMSBY TENNIS CLUB

President Ron Mauro

- very successful and busy season with 300+ adult members
- many events for members, including Wimbledon Whites and Saturday night BYO. New members receive 5 free lessons (3 time options) and have a scheduled play time.
- Canada Week one-day tournament, open to the Region
- hosted Para League days and a Try day for wheelchairs
- ITF Wheelchair event (thanks to Janco Steel sponsorship) will be held again in June 2023
- raised \$2500 to support the new hospital building fund
- set up Jegysoft booking system
- recommend WhatsApp for inter-club communication



NIAGARA PENINSULA TENNIS COMMUNITY

Supporter: Jane Bedard

- NPTC was created in 2013 from Tennis Canada's 'Building Tennis Communities' initiative to explore the spaces between clubs
- ongoing efforts to develop year-round tennis facilities in Niagara Falls and St Catharines - the two largest markets in Ontario with no community tennis structure.



ROSEDALE TENNIS CLUB

SWR volunteer & coach: Toni Ormond

- club dates to 1917; 12 courts including 4 hartru in a year-round bubble, 4 clay and 4 hard outdoor
- very active and successful club with large membership and long waitlist





ALL-CANADIAN TENNIS CENTRE at Hillfield-Strathallan College

Vice President : Kyrylo Tabunshchyk

- this 4-court location is a new project as of 2021
- camps and programs from May to October, servicing 330 players including 100 junior and 45 adult "regulars"
- 21 tournaments were hosted, including 530 players
- growing-the-game program includes parents and kids for 4 weeks at no charge to the families
- 10 college players were trained to run tournaments and assist with programs
- the Tennis Centre is designed as a service to the community. Social development and mental health are key components.

ANCASTER ROGERS TENNIS CENTRE

President : Kerry Radigan

- A warm welcome is extended to our newest member club!
- About \$1.5 million and 6 years of intense volunteer effort have been invested in making Ancaster TC's 5 courts yearround with the addition of a seasonal dome.
- The ward 12 councillor, Lloyd Ferguson, was instrumental in arranging an interest-free loan from the City of Hamilton
- Support from Tennis Canada and Rogers enabled the club to purchase the bubble, rather than having to lease it.
- Ribbon cutting was on November 3.
- There are 440 adult members and 250 juniors, with hundreds more on a waitlist.
- Tournaments, club programs and social events abound.

ALDERSHOT TENNIS CLUB

President: Ron Gelens sent his message

- A half-million dollar clubhouse renovation has been completed
- 4 hard courts and a dome for the winter. The bubble is 25 years old and will be replaced in the fall of 2023.
- Jegysoft program benefits the members for court bookings, and the volunteers for finance and membership.
- 20% of members are new this year, with about 100 potential new members on a waitlist for 2023.
- Junior programs for the summer and the winter are sold out
- Grant applications are an important part of club operations
- Overall a very successful year.

TYANDAGA TENNIS CLUB

President: Robin Smith

- The deck overlooking the 4 courts is a primary gathering place; steel roof added by volunteers big improvement
- 300 members, well-organized with club programs and inter-club teams
- Large junior program for members and non-members
- House league men's doubles is organized with 4 teams each with 12 players; popular pub night finale.
- Club tournaments are held on weekends in August and September; inter-club teams in several leagues
- Resurfacing of two courts has begun; to be completed in the spring





NORTH BURLINGTON TENNIS CLUB

President: Helga Cuddy sent her message

- A small rural club, but making every effort to care for and provide this beautiful facility to our community
- 3 hard courts and a clubhouse
- Spring lessons for juniors plus 4 successful summer camps
- Spring and summer lessons for new and returning adults
- We are a non-profit Joint Venture Community Club, and rely on loyal dedicated volunteers for operations.
- President Helga Cuddy has a versatile skill set: at the time of our meeting, she was at Sunshine Resort in Alberta, training ski instructors.

BURLINGTON TENNIS CLUB

President: Christina Wilson

- Two-storey clubhouse with kitchen, common room and outdoor patio; 6 courts resurfaced late in the season by Court Surface Specialists Ltd. (Trillium grant)
- Club is located in Central Park; formerly called 'Burlington Central TC' prior to reorganization after 2019
- Membership has expanded from 350 (2020) to 776 (2021) to 992 (2022) through dedicated volunteer effort and a collaboration with ACE Tennis.
- Robust orientation for new members : free lessons in May, special Sunday drop-in, important to make connections
- Approach is Try Learn Play Compete
- Hosted club tournaments and OTA events; visited by Simon Burden from OTA office
- Added one pickleball court and offered 100 memberships for it; 20 were purchased.





CEDAR SPRINGS RACQUET CLUB

President: Rob Bradaric

- The premier racquets and fitness facility for families for almost 50 years; 200,000 square feet
- 12 indoor courts year-round
- Racquetball, squash, pickleball, swimming, fitness
- Full range of programs for all ages and experience levels; team events, ladders, clinics
- Has been a stalwart of hosting OTA and ITF tournaments for many years;
- Home to the ACE Academy
- Genuine interest in working cooperatively with community clubs; many options for membership
- Public policy for covid took a heavy toll on indoor facilities, and now rising interest rates are doing the same
- Very generous offer to host a gathering of SouthWest Region in 2023!

MILTON TENNIS CLUB

President: Susan Kitamura sent her message

- When a young team in the ICTA Junior league was outplayed in every match in May/June, they formed a group of 12 dedicated to improving their games with support from the club. By the time Tennis Rocks came around in August, they won!
- Milton also hosted the National Under 16 championships, and saw home club player Andrea Cabio (age 13) share the girls doubles crown.

- 2. The Competitive Structure is OTA's highest priority. It's remarkable to see the number of events hosted in SouthWest Region. Special recognition for this goes to ACE Tennis, who are very supportive of the OTA's programs and also have great expertise.
- 3. Leagues for Team Tennis are a truly remarkable volunteer initiative in our sport, as they can be found around the world and provide regular competition experiences for millions of players.
- 4. Community Tennis Leagues and the World Tennis Number will change the landscape of our sport. It's 150 years since Major Walter Wingfield created "modern tennis" by packaging the game in a box and making it available at a modest price. There are now 300 million players worldwide. WTN aims to connect us.
- 5. Kendra Osa was part of the 2022 class in OTA's initial Passages program. She joined our meeting and shared some comments:
- 30 girls and young women had 10 months of continuous mentorship
- Achieved Instructor Certification and would like to pursue Club Pro 1
- Lasting benefit from the resulting network; safe and comfortable for women coaches
- Learned to create our own projects; grateful to NAT for space for a free program called Girls Fun Tennis
- We need to close the gap with girls dropping out from sports.



- 6. ONCA requires our attention immediately.
- 7. Safe Sport is a top priority for Tennis Canada and OTA, and thus for SouthWest Region.

- OTA was pleased to support our clubs this year with rebates for membership fees and insurance costs.
- Comprehensive and affordable insurance is once again our goal for 2023.
- ClubStrong has been renewed and will be updated on the new OTA website with fresh resources and templates. Please let Suzanne know if you have suggestions for other items that could be included.

General Discussion:

- 1. Ron Mauro suggests a WhatsApp group for club executives to have easy access to each other for sharing information or asking questions. Susan Kitamura has offered to start the group. Those wishing to be included should send a cell phone # to Susan or Rosemary.
- 2. Ron also announced the 2023 Janco Steel Wheelchair Classic will be hosted by Grimsby TC on June 13-16
- 3. Siva Annamalai raised the question of player-matching. How do players find a game when they're travelling, or visiting an area for a short time? Since the meeting, he has added the following for discussion:

I would like to create a matchmaking site. It will improve the level of tennis, and people will play more with ease.

- Easy to find partners to play
- Match them according to their level, time and club or city of availability.
- It will ease gridlock in one club as well as move players around the SW region
- If the system can be implemented for the entire Ontario, and it will be a paradise for all level players and young kids as we keep moving around Ontario for various reasons. They can play for minutes wherever and whenever they want.
- Instead of my son telling me, "I am not coming with you because I will miss tennis and I don't have any suitable players in London to play with me."
- Ease parent's stress about missing tennis
- I often receive this phone call " My tennis rating is 4, and I am free this weekend. Do you have any suitable player to play with me and on vacation here"
- Last but not least, instead of clubs trying to organize events, players will move around and organize little events regularly.

Community Tennis Leagues & World Tennis Number

SouthWest Region has been part of the pilot project phase for the introduction of this international program into Canada. Singles games were offered in the August-October period, and it's proposed we offer doubles games in January-March.

The concept opens the possibility to create connections among a great many more tennis players than is possible with our existing systems, thereby making our sport more inclusive and expansive. This has potential benefits in our dealings with sponsors of all kinds, whether in the corporate field or in the public sector where decision-makers are looking for evidence of our broad-based appeal.

How it will impact our tennis clubs, and what new possibilities will be open to us, remains to be seen. Tennis Canada, the OTA and the other provincial associations are studying options and will decide how the program is to be utilized in 2023.





PASSAGES Women's Mentorship Program



- This program was launched at the start of the year to provide leadership training and mentorship to 30 young women and girls. They've met monthly and received a wide range of experiences and education under the guidance of Rachel Gould and Nikki Carnovale.
- The only candidate from SWR is Kendra Osa of St Catharines. Kendra is a Grade 11 student at Winston Churchill SS, and earned her Instructor Certification as part of the Passages program. Her leadership skills have been put to good use giving lessons at the Niagara-on-the-Lake TC, in her Girls Fun Tennis program, and in other volunteer endeavours. Kendra is

• This program is very important to OTA's new strategic plan, which includes a goal of increasing participation by women and girls. The new <u>Inspire Through Sport</u> builds on the Passages program and has accepted 24 girls for 2023, including one candidate from SouthWest Region.






- **Safe Sport** practices and **Respect in Sport** practices are here to protect our athletes, but also our coaches and everyone involved in tennis.
- We've all received a recent letter from Andrew Chappell via the Tennis Club Connection newsletter system, requesting an updated list of our club professionals and assistants ... anyone involved in teaching on our courts.
- Please treat this with the same level of importance and urgency that is given to the other essential elements of your administration systems. Any failure anywhere regarding Safe Sport in tennis tarnishes everyone involved in the sport.
- Through the TPA, all our coaches and instructors will be having an annual background check, and will be renewing their <u>Declaration of Character</u> and <u>Code of Conduct</u> forms annually.



• A Parent Awareness Campaign will educate parents on the significance of coaches being fully certified, and provide links for them to check a coach's certifications. It will also encourage parents to complete a Respect in Sport Parent module, as everyone has a role to play in creating safe and positive environments for participants to enjoy and prosper in tennis.

GOAL #5 ... EXPAND THE ICTA DIVISION IN NIAGARA REGION

Establish "Team Try-outs" as a feature of the April events schedule at each Niagara club. Strive for 5 teams for each of Mixed, Ladies, 55+ leagues. Explore possibilities for Junior teams to play in May and June.

GOAL #6 RECYCLING and SUSTAINABILITY

Identify players interested in finding solutions to recycling of tennis balls and their containers. Support efforts to network and coordinate.

GOAL #7 PILOT PROJECT FOR SCHOOL + COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Establish school-based starter-level kids' tennis at St Davids School in Niagara-on-the-Lake, from January to April.

Develop volunteer crew, all with Community Tennis Facilitator qualifications (via TPA). In May and June, relocate the program to open courts in St Davids Park for after-school and weekends.

In July and August, build a community tennis network in the park, with scheduled activities for kids and for adults.

GOAL #8 ... PILOT PROJECT FOR COORDINATION WITH OSGA (55+)

Determine whether tennis events are planned, or could be instituted, in District 21 (Halton), District 22 (Hamilton) and District 25 (Brant-Haldimand-Norfolk). Within District 24 (Niagara), schedule playoffs for 55+, 65+, 70+, 75+ and 80+.

GOAL #9 EXPLORE POSSIBILITIES FOR MODIFIED TENNIS GAMES

Introduce Spec Tennis to players with access to small courts ($20' \times 44'$). Explore opportunities for red-ball tennis for young children on the small courts.

GOAL #10 ... EXPLORE WAYS TO AMPLIFY THE IMPACT OF OFSAA COMPETITION

Create a liaison with the tennis convenors for Region 6: Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference (Halton and Hamilton), and for Region 13: Southern Ontario Secondary Schools Association (Niagara and Hamilton).

Feature the competitions and the winners in SWR communications.
